January 17 Meeting Preview "Northern Saw-whet Owls"

Presented by Adam Zorn & Al Eibel Huston-Brumbaugh Nature Center, Alliance

Learn about the Huston-Brumbaugh Nature Center's Saw-whet Owl banding project initiated in 2015...

The Northern Saw-whet Owl is a common, but elusive, species of owl with a range that extends across the northern half of North America. Their small size and penchant for nesting and roosting in dense evergreen forests make them difficult to find. Their migration biology is even more mysterious! Local bird bander Al Eibel and naturalist Adam Zorn will share what they've learned about Saw-whets from their banding efforts over the past 3 years.

Al Eibel is a retired Alliance High School biology teacher and coach. He became involved with bird banding in 2003 with master bander Gary Fowler on a First Energy grant that monitored birds in power line corridors in Cuyahoga Valley National Park. Al monitors nestbox trails at his home, Molly Stark Park, Quail Hollow Park, Alliance Middle School, and the Castle in Alliance. Al also bands rehabbed birds at the Stark County Park District's Sanders Center and Fichtner Park.

Adam Zorn is currently the program manager at the University of Mount Union's Huston-Brumbaugh Nature Center. He has been an educator/naturalist for 15 years and enjoys sharing his passion for birds with others. Join Al and Adam to learn more about one of North America's smallest species of owls.

Beware of the Mantis: Note to Hummers (From NEWS of the Wild – National Wildlife December – January 2018)

Armed with powerful front legs, praying mantises are voracious carnivores that depend on insects and other arthropods as their primary prey. Now research shows that these opportunistic predators also frequently kill and eat small birds like ruby-throated hummingbirds.

In a systematic review of studies conducted in 13 countries on every continent except Antarctica, a team of Swiss and U.S. researchers uncovered 147 cases of mantises catching 24 different species belonging to 14 avian families. Writing in The Wilson Journal of Ornithology, the scientists reported in the U.S., where mantises often capture hummingbirds at feeders or at plants pollinated by hummingbirds in residential gardens. "The fact that the eating of birds is so widespread among praying mantises, but taxonomically as well as geographically speaking, is a spectacular discovery," says University of Basel biologist Martin Nyffeler, the study's lead author. About 2,3000 mantis species range throughout the world, so bird lovers, watch your feeders.

Snowy Irruption!

To quote Laura Dornan, "Yep, think this is going to be a pretty good irruption year for both snowys & red crossbills". That was her comment when I emailed her after Lee and I returned from a weekend Bird Watcher's Digest Reader Rendezvous in the Cleveland area the first weekend of December.

We had seen 4 snowy owls on Friday around the south shore of Lake Erie, and Burke Lakefront airport. Saturday we saw about 6 more to the west, in Erie County. Also had a report from Black Swamp Bird Observatory



seeing 10 around the Cleveland area (some were probably duplicates of the ones we had seen). There is a report of one in Holmes County, and we have heard of one sighted in the state of Texas. Also, that state to the north of OH is reporting irruptions also.

So get out there and find those white, fluffy owls!

Laura also finished her email with, "i think we will go crossbill searching in the next few days." So you might want to ask Laura & Tim if they have been successful in finding crossbills.

Canton Audubon Society Arnold Fritz Memorial Scholarship

The Canton Audubon Society is accepting applications for the **Arnold W. Fritz Memorial Scholarship for Environmental Stewardship** through March 1, 2018, for the fall school year of 2018.

The \$1,000 scholarship is in memory of one of our organization's founders (1962). Dr Fritz was a professor at Malone College (now Malone University) for many years. He, and fellow

Canton Audubon Society members then founded the Stark Wilderness Center (The Wilderness Center) in 1964. The purpose of the scholarship is to encourage college students, through financial support, to study environmental science, conservation, natural history and nature-related subjects, including environmental law.

To be eligible, the applicants must be a junior, senior, or graduate student at the time of the award. They may be a sophomore at the time of application. They should be majoring in any environmental science discipline or in law or business with ful intent on pursuing a career in the environmental field.

Applicants should reside in **OR** attend school in any of the following Ohio counties:

Ashland, Carroll, Columbiana, Coshocton, Guernsey, Harrison, Holmes, Jefferson, Knox, Mahoning, Medina, Muskingum, Portage, Stark, Summits, Tuscarawas, Wayne

The deadline for submitting applications and supporting documentation is March 1, 2018 for the fall 2018 scholarship.

How Lights at Night Affect Pollinators

For the first time, scientists have shown that artificial lights at night interfere with the ability of plants to produce seeds and of moths and other nocturnal pollinators to gather food. "So far, nocturnal pollinators have been largely neglected in the discussion of the worldwide known pollinator crisis," says University of Bern ecologist Eva Knop.

In extensive field studies conducted in a remote area of Switzerland, Knop and her colleagues used night vision goggles to record visits of more than 300 different insect species to flowers of 60 species in dark meadows. Nearby, after illuminating LED lights on poles similar to those used on urban streets in Europe, the scientists found that insect visits to the plants declined by 62 percent.

They also discovered that plants exposed to the lights produced fewer fruits than their unlit counterparts. The effects of such light pollution, the scientists explain in *Nature*, could also affect diurnal pollinators through declines in available food resources.
