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September Meeting Preview "Lights Out Akron / Canton" Presented by Shane Good

Shane has served as an Animal Curator at the Akron Zoo since 2012, managing the Zoo's avian collection. Before coming to the Akron Zoo he spent 20 years working as an Animal Keeper at the Cleveland Metroparks Zoo. He serves on the Association of Zoos and Aquariums' (AZA) Passerine Taxon Advisory Group (TAG). Akron Zoo boasts a large North American Songbird Aviary and in recent years Shane has been working closely with fellow zoo curators toward advancing North American Songbird conservation initiatives. Shane is a national member of Audubon and locally he has helped coordinate Akron Zoo's participation in the Greater Akron Audubon Society's Annual Christmas Bird Counts and Summer Bird Counts.

Shane will be speaking about local efforts to initiate a ("Lights Out Akron/Canton" program. Sponsors of the program include Akron Zoo, Stark Parks, Cleveland Museum of Natural History, the Ohio Bird Conservation Initiative, and others. Every spring and fall, millions of birds migrate through Northeast Ohio on their way to or from their breeding grounds. Many birds migrate at night, and lights on tall buildings or aimed at the sky can disorient them and draw them into the buildings. This causes many birds to strike windows or circle buildings until they fall from exhaustion. Building collisions are a leading cause of bird fatality during migration in North America, estimated to kill 550 million birds each year. The goal of Lights Out Akron/Canton is to reduce the number of birds killed by flying into buildings and windows. Similar programs in cities across the country have proven to be very successful in reducing bird/window collisions. Volunteers in Akron and Canton concluded their first season of monitoring in 2018.

"Restoration of Sippo Lake and
Cottonseed Wetlands"
Presented by Nick Morris

Nick Morris is the owner of Kestrel Community Solutions; a consulting firm working with public, nonprofit, and community-based organizations and an of conservation. sustainability instructor and environmental education at Kent State University. Prior work includes multiple roles at Stark Parks, all focused on education. He earned a B.S. in Biology from Muskingum University, a M.Ed. from Walsh University, and a Ph.D. in Cultural Foundations of Education from Kent State University. His research interests focus on environmental/place-based education. parks, education for sustainability. Nick lives on a small farm with his wife, children and a menagerie animals.

Visit Your Local Tiny Green Space Time Magazine – October 2, 2017

Getting outside is a reliable way to feel better. Nature can offer stress relief, a more active lifestyle and a salve for mental illness. But this effect isn't limited to forests or beaches that may be miles away. Growing research suggests that any kind of green space – backyards, neighborhood parks, dog walks – can make you happier.

You don't even need a lot of it. One study in the Netherlands found that people who think of their local green spaces as more accessible and unable felt more satisfied with their neighborhood, regardless

of the amount of green space they had. Neighborhood satisfaction was also linked with happiness and better mental health.

Green spaces seem to be at their most healthful when they're functional, easy to get to, clean and well lit. "If it's a social space, where people meet and chat and go on walks, that kind of contact and interaction builds social networks," says Dr. Andrew Lee, a public health researcher at the University of Sheffield in England. — Abigail Abrams -


